Call for Sunshine Week Sites and Co-sponsors

Participate in the Second National Dialogue on Open Government and Secrecy during Sunshine Week 2007

Below, you will find a Save the Date announcement for the Second National Dialogue on Open Government and Secrecy, March 12, 2007. This year the program is titled "Closed Doors; Open Democracies?" The program will focus on access to government information, including the impact of government suppression and manipulation of scientific information on public health and safety and accountability. The dialogue will start with

a lively discussion of the issues and end with ideas for action. The program will be webcast from the National Press Club in Washington, DC to host sites around the country.

How You Can Get Involved: We are seeking institutional partners. Partners can be:

1. Host Site: Host sites must be able to receive a streaming video feed, underwrite a site license fee of no more than \$300, and show the national program to an audience of, ideally, 5 to 500 people. Working with other local sponsors, hosts are encouraged to organize an audience discussion or panel presentation after the local program to discuss open government from a community perspective. Please note: Production and dissemination costs for the webcast may be higher than last year's satellite feed, but we are aiming to charge less than \$300 and still assure a quality product. We will inform those who respond of the exact cost by 12/20/06.

And/Or

2. A Local Program Sponsor: Sponsors may work with host sites to plan local programs immediately following the national program. The national program will be webcast from the National Press Club in Washington, DC to communities around the country.

Volunteers: We are also inviting individuals at the local and state levels to identify themselves as resources for their communities. We will be creating state level organizing groups that will (with assistance from the national organizers) work with others in their states to help identify host sites and plan the event locally, including follow-up discussions.

Technical Requirements for Host Sites: The program will be webcast by streaming video that will require log-in information, which host sites will receive after they register. The webcast can be projected from a computer onto a bigger screen to show to a larger audience. The National Press Club has suggested that host sites have a Windows operating system and Windows Media Player; we will send out a survey to those who express interest to try to match your local technical requirements.

When? The event will be held on Monday, March 12, 2007 1:00pm- 2:30pm EST. Registration for this event begins in early January 2007. Open Division: for active and retired AALL members and law librarians with five or more years of professional experience;

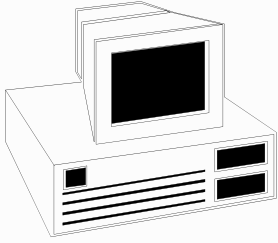
New Members Division: for recent graduates and AALL members who have been in the profession for less than five years; and the
