

## Book Review

### **Review of *Internet Legal Research on a Budget: Free and Low-Cost Resources for Lawyers*, by Carole A. Levitt and Judy K. Davis (ABA Law Practice Division, 2014)**

Internet Legal Research on a Budget is a resource guide aimed toward lawyers. As a result, it made for slow reading by this librarian. That being said, I think the book will be very useful to my office and will definitely suggest it to newer associates who still think everything is out there on the Internet for free. The authors are very qualified to write a book on this topic, as both have been lawyers and are now law librarians. My biggest peeve with the book was that frequently the explanation of a website feature and the illustration of the same feature ended up being on different pages.

The book is divided into sections by type of research. The categories are General Research, Legal Portals and Directories, Case Law Databases, Bar Association Free member-Benefit Databases, Researching Legislation, Additional Research Sources, and Checking Your Research. Within each part are chapters discussing specific aspects of the broader topics. Besides Internet sites for research, there is also a chapter describing some of the many apps available for



legal research. This is a great addition, as attorneys are using mobile devices more frequently and want information at their fingertips. The authors do a good job of showing how to search any website that has quirks, and the illustrations are very helpful. I like the breakdown into topics and subparts, and I think the authors have done a good job of explaining the pros and cons of each website.

The biggest drawback to the book is that it's in print, and the Internet changes so rapidly that the book was almost out of date when it was published. The authors do give dates for some of the websites shown, acknowledging that there may be changes by the time someone reads the book. The other drawback was the positioning of the illustrations and text, although that seemed to be confined to the first half of the book.

I think that this book would be especially good for law school and public law library collections. It would be very helpful for a solo attorney, or a student doing legal research, as those individuals may not have access to a law library or law librarian quickly. I'm going to recommend it to some of my associates, and will definitely be suggesting it to summer associates.

**Patti:** How did you end up becoming a law librarian?

**Nano:** I was definitely a “late bloomer.” My introduction to librarianship was on a very basic level. As a faculty wife with a small child, I did contract work for the library at St. Thomas High



School writing thank you letters to donors and typing bookplates. The librarian recommended me for a part-time position at the University of St. Thomas in the periodicals department. It was a wonderful place to learn the ropes. The other staff members were very helpful. I felt inadequate fielding some of the questions from the students, so I took the 2 courses offered by extension from UT, Basic Reference and Cataloging. There was a direct connection to what I was doing, so I decided I

wanted to pursue a degree. The problem was that library school was in Austin and I was in Houston. The only way to do it was to attend the summer sessions for 3 years and transfer in some graduate credit from UH. It was difficult to leave my husband and young son and live in a dorm for 6 weeks every summer! Since I have a teaching certificate, I geared my degree plan to be a school librarian. By the time I finished, the openings for school positions were few and far between, so I went looking elsewhere. I began with corporate, medical and law firm libraries. A friend steered me towards Andrews Kurth because their librarian was about to retire.

**P:** Since you didn't come to AK with a law background, how invaluable was HALL?

**N:** I had the luxury of training with my predecessor for nearly a year before she left. I think HALL had only been in formal existence for a few years. As a newcomer, I thought the librarians might be "territorial" and protective of their resources. That idea was quickly dispelled after the first meeting I attended. The members were open, friendly, and very willing to share not only materials but their expertise. Jane Holland, Susan Yancey, T.L. Maulsby, and Karl Gruben were instrumental in establishing the cooperative spirit of the group that remains today. In those days, "networking" meant lots of phone calls and discussions at the lunch meetings. We all faced the same issues and it was helpful to see how everyone approached different problems. The solution is always tailored to particular circumstances, but it is reassuring to know you are on the right track.

**P:** What are the major changes in the job since you started?

**N:** The job now "looks" different because technology is the centerpiece. When I started, all I had was a telephone and a typewriter. But underneath all the software, Internet sources, and online products, the essence of librarianship is still there. It still takes resourcefulness, ingenuity, imagination, and a good portion of common sense to make use of it all.

**P:** What is your most fun memory?

## Law Librarianship History

### *By the Day*

**December 4, 1779:** First "chair of law" established at the College of William and Mary in Virginia, giving rise to the College's claim to being the first American law school. George Wythe was the first to fill the position becoming America's first law professor.

**January 1, 1992:** Legal Information Institute was established at Cornell Law School and launched the first law site on the Internet. At the time, it offered free access to U.S. Supreme Court opinions and the U.S. Code using Gopher, a precursor to today's HTML-based World Wide Web.

**February 1, 2010:** WestlawNext was unveiled at LegalTech New York.

**N:** My first AALL conference was very memorable. I had been with AK about 2 years and the meeting was in Washington, D.C. I enjoyed the vendor displays, the presentations, seeing my friends from HALL, and meeting new people. I felt like all the pieces were falling into place and this was definitely going to be my career path. A few years later, I also had the opportunity to visit the West operations in Eagan, Minnesota. The focus at that time was entirely on the print products. On another trip, several of us visited the Lexis campus in Dayton. I think it was still being called “Mead Data Central!”

**P:** What do you feel is your biggest accomplishment?

**N:** In 2007, we renovated our library space. It entailed moving everything out and relocating to the basement of our building for three months. We didn’t just store the materials, we actually set up a working library in the basement. It was a very tight fit and it tested our resourcefulness. Planning and executing the two moves (to the basement and back to the new space) was the biggest project I had ever been involved in. Margo had more experience in moving and rearranging library space, so I followed her lead. We worked as a team and got it done. Even the movers were impressed that everything “fit like a glove.” We didn’t miss a beat in our service to the firm either – that’s a good thing/bad thing. I think the scale of what we were doing and our stress level went unnoticed!

**P:** Is there anything you would have done differently?

**N:** I wish I had started on a career in librarianship sooner. It took a while to find my “north star.” It has been challenging, stimulating, and fulfilling. I have made good friends, both personal and professional. All in all – a good ride.

**P:** Any other thoughts/advice?

**N:** Keep things as simple as you can to get the job done. Quality control is essential. Build in safety nets to catch errors as you work through a process or project.

**P:** What do you like to read? It doesn’t have to be work related.

**N:** I’m sort of stuck on early American/Texas history right now. The time around World War II is interesting to me also because I think about my parents and what they experienced.

**P:** What’s next for you?

**N:** I’ve been involved with the Rodeo since before AK, so I will continue with that. I’ve been a member of the Special Children’s Committee for 33 years and I am now Chairman of the Scholarship Administration Committee. All of that will take me through the end of March and then I can start pursuing some other volunteer work. I’ve got a stack of books to read and lots of hobbies that need attention. A trip to New York in May is in the planning stages. I can’t give up my friends at AK and HALL, so I’m sure there will be some lunches at Maggie Rita’s and Treebeards in the future!

This concludes a conversation with Nano.

- Discussion of the SWALL meeting – deciding to host the meeting or co-sponsor it. There was some discussion of pros and cons of both. The Board decided we needed more information to make a decision, so we will revisit.
  - The HALL web site has had its share of troubles of late so the Board decided to look for a new hosting company. Richard Guajardo will be able to work with the new vendor to get the site running more smoothly.
  - The Board is in favor of a re-design of our web site. Joe suggested SquareSpace as a good option for our site. It's easy to publish content and they can also host our site. Shelby made a motion to switch to SquareSpace and Joe seconded it.

If we do not get a volunteer, we will just let SWALL and DALL they can organize the event if they want it to continue.
