**Kit Kreilick** has been the Manager of Research Training at Sullivan & Cromwell, LLP since 2006. Prior to that she was a librarian at Fordham, Cornell and St. Louis University Law Schools, where she taught legal research to first-year law students. As an Adjunct Professor at Fordham, Kit also taught an Advanced Legal Research seminar. Kit received her B.A. and J.D. degrees from Valparaiso University and her M.L.L. degree from the University of Washington.

**Don MacLeod** has been a law librarian for more than twenty-five years. He is the Electronic Services Librarian at Debevoise & Plimpton LLP, where he manages the training program for the Library and Knowledge Management Department. Don is the editor of *Internet Law Researcher* and *Internet Connection*, and wrote two editions of *The Internet Guide for the Legal Researcher*. He is currently at work on a book titled *How to Find Out Anything*, a guide to online research for non-librarians.

**Jim Murphy**, the Continuing Education Librarian at Dewey & LeBoeuf, is responsible for developing and implementing the firm's Library training programs. Prior to joining Dewey, Jim worked for more than ten years as a Reference Librarian and Adjunct Professor at Brooklyn Law School.
