2008 Institute: Clearing up Confusion with IP

Thursday, March 27, 2008, 8:45 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

How many times have you as a law librarian wanted to be able to efficiently search the databases at the Patent and Trademark Offices, or have a better understanding of whether your copying falls within one of the exemptions of the Copyright Act, including fair use?

Here is your opportunity to participate in an institute designed to help you better understand the intricacies of trademark, patent, and copyright law, and to help you more effectively meet the needs of your users. Join us to 1.) learn what trademarks are, how they are used in the real world, and the most common problems associated with registering a mark; 2.) learn basic patent law principles and how to use readily available resources for conducting research in the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office; 3.) understand better some of the complexities of the copyright law as it relates to the use of digital information; and, 4.) learn from an expert the issues at the cutting edge of these laws. The 2008 SEAALL Institute brings together a trademark examiner – **Rebecca Eisinger**, a patent depository librarian – **Joanne Dugan**, a law professor – **Peter Jaszi**, and a practitioner – **Christopher Wolf**, Proskauer Rose, to discuss these issues. Participants will have time to practice searching the PTO databases during each of the morning sessions.

Key Note Speaker Judge Leonie Brinkema will speak at Noon. She will walk over from the US District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia, in Alexandria, to discuss her career since leaving law librarianship (MLS, Rutgers 1970), including the Zacarias Moussaoui trial. Lunch is included in the institute. Additional lunch tickets can be purchased for \$50.00 on the registration form.

Come to Alexandria, Virginia early and join us for this day-long workshop designed to help you better understand IP in your life and the law, and take full advantage of an opportunity to develop your research techniques in searching for IP.

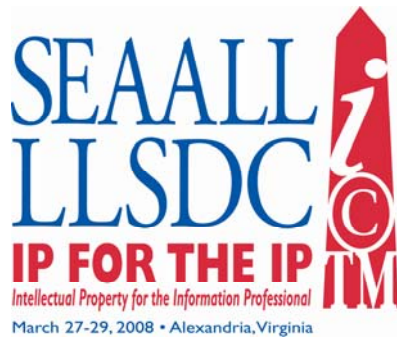

A 1: Information Wars: The Clash of Law, Digital Technology and the Internet

Speaker: Raymond T. Nimmer, Dean and Leonard Childs Professor of Law
University of Houston Law Center

Intellectual property is at the center of the formative forces shaping the modern information economy and at the center of a fundamental dispute between groups with diametric views of whether property rights should expand or contract. This presentation examines the conflict as it applies to various issues in reference to digital information technology, including the DMCA, Internet, and the use of file sharing technologies.

A 2: Food for Thought (or not): Judging Food Advertising

Speaker: Richard J. Leighton, Esq.

Nationally-known advertising lawyer Richard Leighton tells the inside story on how you can spot false or misleading food advertising. He explains, in plain English, how you can apply the principles used by courts, regulators, and consumer and business lawyers for determining whether an advertisement should be challenged.

A 3: Work Smarter, Not Harder: Delegate and Motivate for Success!

Speakers: Carol Avery Nicholson, Associate Director for Technical Services, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Law Library; Karen Douglas, Head of Technical Services Duke University School of Law Library; Alan Keely, Associate Director for Collection Services and Systems, Wake Forest University Professional Center Library

B 1: Intellectual Property Rights Enforcement

Speaker: FBI Supervisory Special Agent Douglas J. Raubal, Cyber Division

Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), including trademarks, copyrights and trade secrets, are protected by federal law. Those investigated by the FBI for violating these statutes include individuals, organized crime syndicates, corporations and even representatives of foreign governments. The presentation will examine

these violations, how they differ from one another and present case studies of relevant FBI investigations. The speaker will also discuss the importance of IPR investigations to the US economy and to the health and safety of US citizens.

B 2: Playing Big Brother to Top Models, Biggest Losers, and American Idols: Surviving the Reality of Personnel Management

Speakers: Marin Dell, Reference Librarian, Florida State University Law Library; Elizabeth (DeDe) Bradsher, Bibliographic Services Librarian, George H. Jones, Jr. Law Library; Tim Lewis, Director of the Law Library and State Law Librarian for the state of Alabama; Moderator: Elizabeth Farrell.

This program is designed to address issues with difficult staff members and library teams that are resistant to change. Topics discussed will include: how to recognize a problem with staff and/or co-workers and the various ways to resolve the problem; the effects that personnel interaction (both positive and negative) can have on library workflows and services; motivation techniques for staff and colleagues; how to attract and retain good library personnel; and the “how, when and why” of employee dismissal. The speakers also will address from personal experience how academic library science programs can better prepare library students for real-world management positions after graduation.

B 3: Managing Your Boss

Speakers: Carol Bredemeyer, Associate Professor of Law Library Services and Assistant Director for Faculty Services, Northern Kentucky University Chase College of Law; Joyce Manna Janto, Deputy Director, University of Richmond School of Law Library.

A Middle Manager not only has to manage the people they supervise, they must also manage their relationship with their own supervisor. This program will discuss how to manage that relationship to the benefit of both middle manager and boss (librarian or not). One of the speakers has an older boss and one speaker has a younger boss.

C 1: So You Think You Can Teach: Five Lessons in 50 Minutes

Speakers: Ron Wheeler, Associate Director for Public Services, Georgia State University Law Library; Rhea Ballard-Thrower, Director, Howard University Law Library; Pamela Melton, Associate Director for Administration, University of South Carolina Coleman Karesh Law Library; Donna Nixon, Assistant Director for Public Services, University of North Carolina Kathrine R. Everett Law Library; Faye Jones, Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law, Florida State University; Moderator, Nancy Johnson, Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law, Georgia State University

This program presents an innovative alternative to talking about teaching research. The audience will see a variety of great teachers actually teach! Whether you teach a credit class or give occasional lectures, you will learn new techniques. It will be fun for the participants and for the audience. The teachers will not be judged and there will be no voting. Instructors can have fun and can experiment with different teaching methods. There will be a Q and A at the end

of the program. Instructors will highlight innovative teaching techniques that keep their students engaged in learning legal research. The audience will learn the best way to teach several very narrow topics. The instructors may use TWEN, WebCT, Blackboard, or PowerPoint. In addition, they may use clickers or instant polling techniques to keep the students engaged.

C2: Inane or Practical: Facebook and the Information Professional

Speaker: Sarah Glassmeyer, Reference Librarian, University of Kentucky College of Law Library

Are you confused by the Facebook phenomenon? Are you unsure if it has any practical applications in a law firm or academic library environment? Do you find the whole thing to be quite silly? This program will try to demystify Facebook and show you how it can be used in a library setting. Topics covered will include basic how-tos, tips and tricks of the site and a discussion of a Facebook experiment within an academic law library setting.

C3: Has “Everything”: Made it Into Your Disaster Plan?

Speakers: Ajaye Bloomstone, Acquisitions Librarian, Louisiana State University Law Library; Charlene Cain, Head of Access Services, Louisiana State University Law Library; Randy Thompson, Associate Vice Chancellor for the Library and Information Technology, Louisiana State University Law.

In August of 2005, Hurricane Katrina devastated the Gulf Coast, creating an untold amount of damage to lives, property, careers, and institutions. Many others were affected by the collateral damage, with Baton Rouge essentially hosting a considerable part of the greater New Orleans population after the hurricane and the flooding of that city. The trickle down effect of how we and our institutions were affected by the aftermath of the storm is something that was not previously contemplated. Here is the story of how our library dealt with the situation in terms of student (and community) population growth and attempting to provide services to many more individuals, the uncertainty of if we still had a budget, vendor relations, database cleanup, and logistical issues with receiving shipments, with suggestions for enhancing a library’s existing disaster plan.

Return of Nazi Contraband: A Case Study

Dr. Kurtz's talk will focus on the political, legal, and moral dilemmas faced by the United States and its allies after World War II in restituting millions of items of cultural property looted by the Nazis. Examples from the worlds of art, libraries, and archives will be used to demonstrate the complex intersections of Cold War and post-Cold War policies and the Holocaust which continue to challenge governments and the international community.

D 1: Preservation: A Game Show

Speaker: Patricia Turpening, Booklover Consulting

The formats of materials found in libraries today are changing every day. This program will present preservation concepts for libraries in a game show format. After each question is asked and the contestants have given their answers, Pat will give a brief educational presentation relating to the question.

D 2: Walking in a Wiki Wonderland

Speaker: Ellen Callinan, Axelroth and Associates

According to the Gartner Group, wikis will be mainstream collaboration tools in at least 50% of companies by 2009. Despite the relative ease of deployment, the best wikis draw on usability principles from web design and include solid architecture and content. While IT departments mobilize to identify and launch the best enterprise applications, librarians can explore the world of free wiki applications now to master their use and develop effective design and content skills. This program will compare several wiki software tools, explore successful applications of wikis and describe best practices for building and maintaining wikis in collaborative project and team management.

D 3: Reporting on Government Agencies

Speakers: Paul Albergo, Chief of Correspondents for BNA and Adjunct Associate Professor, American University's School of Communication; Nancy Ognanovich, White House Correspondent, BNA; Moderator: Michael Bernier, Assistant Director of Library Relations, BNA

All journalists must understand their subscribers so they can stand in their shoes. For reporters with the specialized press, such as BNA, the challenge is twofold: understand the complex work of the professionals who subscribe to our services; and navigate Byzantine world of government at all levels to uncover those developments of import to those subscribers. This session examines how reporters of the specialized press manage that challenge and spotlights how these reporters do their jobs. Information professionals will come away from this

session with a better understanding of how specialized publications are put together, helping them in turn to better serve their end users.

E 1: Terms of Use Contracting to Control Website Use and Resources through Clickwrap and Browsewrap

Speaker: John Cannan, Montgomery County Circuit Court Law Library

Whenever you surf the Internet, chances are you've been entering into enforceable contracts without even knowing it. Thanks to court sanctification of "clickwrap" and "browsewrap" licenses, Internet sites can impose a variety of terms on the users, including creating intellectual property protections that go beyond those set by copyright law. This presentation will discuss why and how these licenses exist and the more common terms contained in the agreements or licenses. The context of this discussion will be online digital image archives but will also include other types of internet sites as well.

E 2: Geek Speak for Librarians and Information Professionals

Speaker: Paul Weiss, Library Technician, Keller and Heckman, LLP

This program will provide a discussion about various computer technologies that have weighty impact on librarians and information professionals. The program will address the current state and future of computer technologies in libraries with an emphasis on hardware, software, geek speak, databases and technical support and time for questions at the end of the program.

E 3: Is There a Future for Academic Law Libraries?

Speakers: Lisa Smith Butler, Assistant Dean, Law Library and Technology Center and Associate Professor of Law, Nova Southeastern University; Karl Gruben, Law Library Director and Associate Professor of Law, St. Thomas University Law Library

This program will discuss the future of academic law library issues: space, collections, services, formats, librarian roles, and technology. The potential impact from Educating Lawyers and Best Practices in Legal Education will also be referenced.

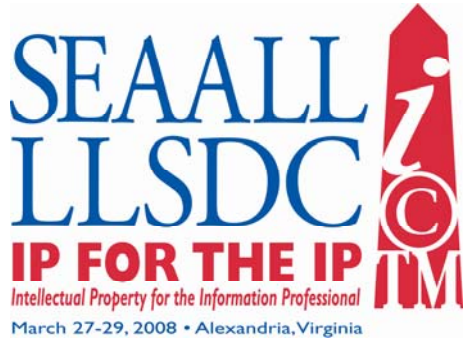

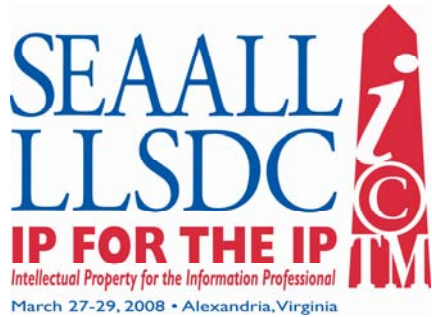
