AALL/Thomson West George A. Strait Minority Scholarship Endowment

The George A. Strait Minority Scholarship is awarded to minority students who best embody career goals of the law library profession. Recipients are college graduates with law library experience who are members of a minority group and are degree candidates in accredited library or law schools. The scholarship was established in 2001 by AALL and with a \$150,000 pledge from Thomson West.

George A. Strait (1914-1989) was an outstanding law librarian and longtime AALL member. He held several titles at the Harvard Law School Library during a 20-year span (1956-1976), which was interrupted twice: in 1967-69, when he built the library collection at Northeastern University School of Law (Boston), and in 1972-74, when he built the library collection at the Antioch School of Law (Washington, D.C.). After leaving Harvard, he was director of the law library and professor of law at the University of Iowa College of Law. In recognition of his career achievements, Mr. Strait was awarded the AALL (now Marian Gould Gallagher) Distinguished Service Award in 1989. In 1990 the AALL Executive Board made the minority stipend a permanent part of the Association's scholarship program and named it in his honor.
