Discovery & Retrieval

Enabling Subject Access



- “The limited number of subject headings assigned to monographs as well as the practice of providing a more general subject heading for a monograph that covers several more specific topics resulted in very inadequate subject access to monographs.” Vinh-The Lam

Entry Level Vocabulary



- 505 and 520 notes account for the largest percentage increase in the number of unique words in bibliographic records, with averages of 15.5 new subject terms per record. Calhoun & Markey, 1987.

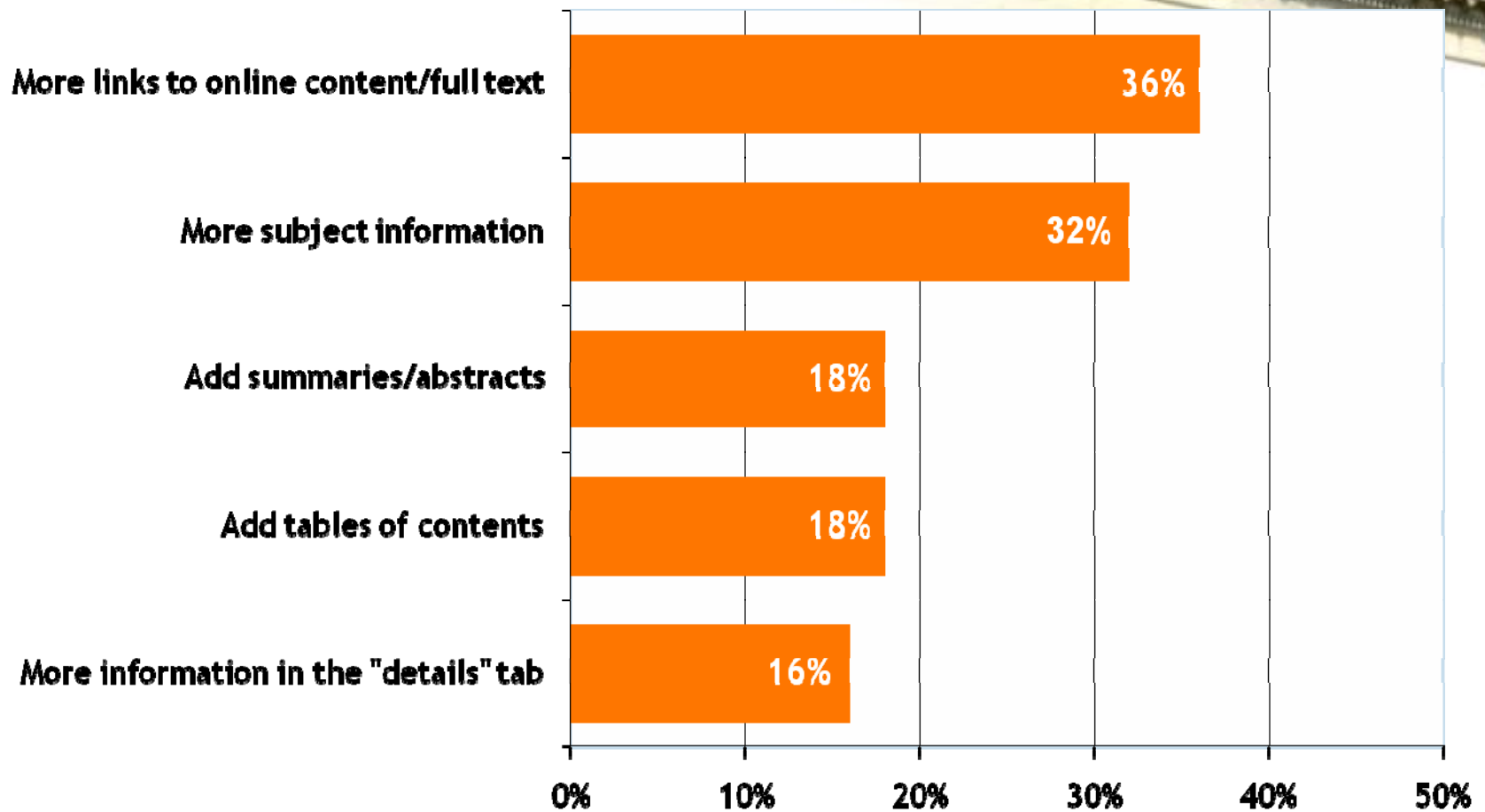
Entry Level Vocabulary



- If a bridge to bib records is established, key words would provide effective access to controlled vocabularies. Bates & others, 1990s.

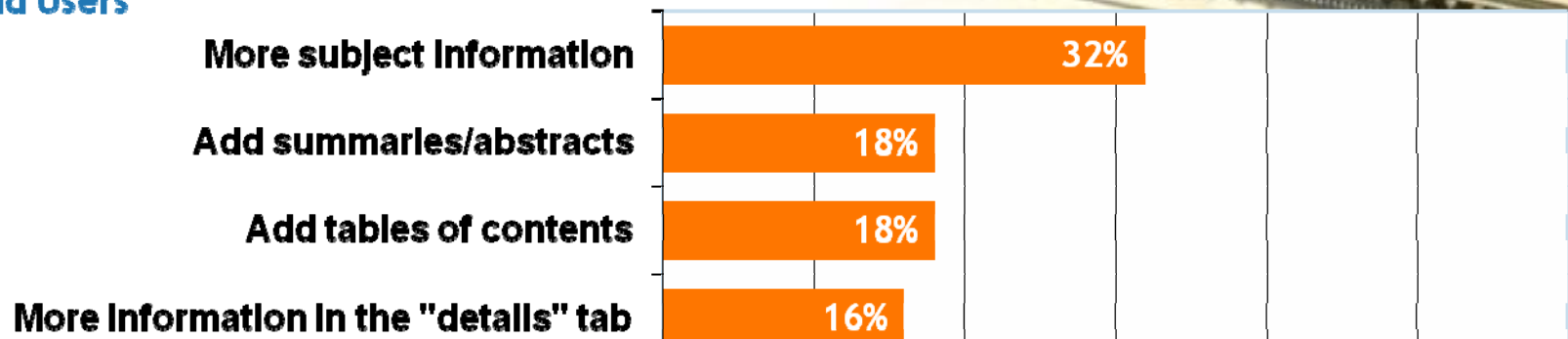

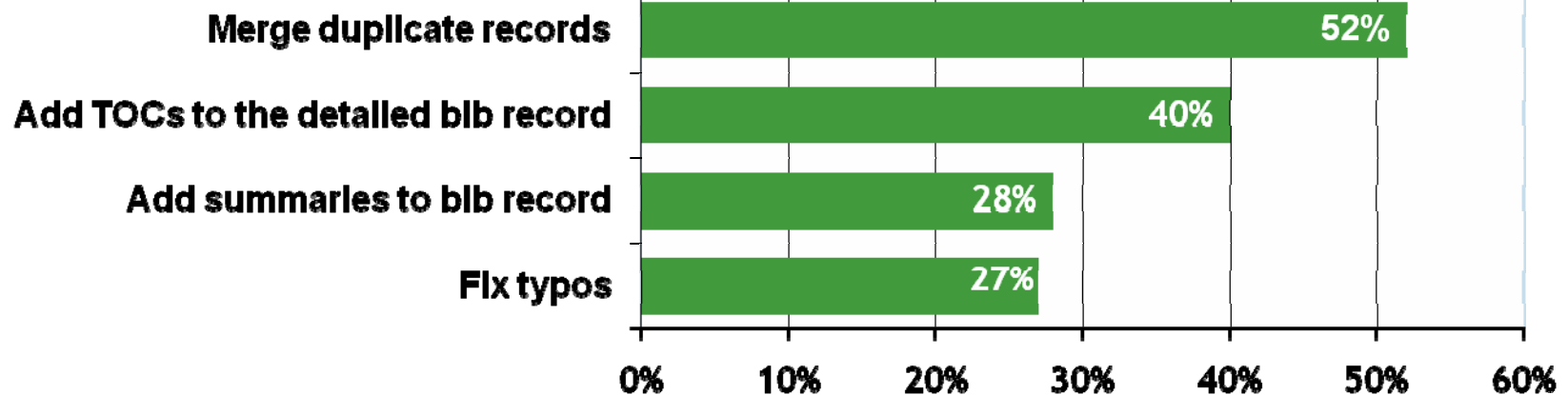

Projects for Providing TOC data at LC

- dTOC (digital table of contents)
- Korean TOC
- E-CIP
- ONIX (ONline Information eXchange)
- ONIX pilot



dTOC

- Scanned from photocopies of TOC
- All languages/subjects in scope
- Roman scripts converted to text
- HTML wrapped around
- Non-roman scripts converted to PDF
- All linked in 856 field
- Varies 7-20K per year



Korean TOC

- Searched by ISBN via the web at NLK
- Downloaded and saved to a file
- In Korean text (searchable)
- HTML wrapped around
- Linked in 856
- Just started 2009 (<2K)



E-CIP TOC

- Part of application data submitted by publisher for CIP
- Already in electronic form
- 5 minutes or less to process
- In 505 field in the record
- 19K per year

ONIX TOC

- Extracted from ONIX data supplied by publishers
- Same data that Amazon, B&N, Borders, etc. receive
- All linked in 856 field
- Varies 5K-35K per year



ONIX data

- International standard for information exchange in the publishing industry
- World coordination provided by EDItEUR
- U.S./Canada represented by the BISAC Metadata Committee
- Australia, Belgium, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway, Korea, Russia, Spain, Sweden, UK

ONIX Pilot

- Report of The Library of Congress Working Group on the Future of Bibliographic Control, *_On the Record_*, section 1.1, Eliminate Redundancies, has several recommendations for using externally available bibliographic data and for further automating the CIP process.



ONIX Pilot

The good:

- Same ONIX files as ONIX TOC
- Use ONIX as the basis for CIP record
- Starter record created in under 15 seconds
- TOC in 505 field in the record
- No additional cost



ONIX Pilot

The bad:

- Request CIP before ONIX available
- Data aimed towards marketing
- Inconsistent treatment of data
- Lack of XML repository, rely on files

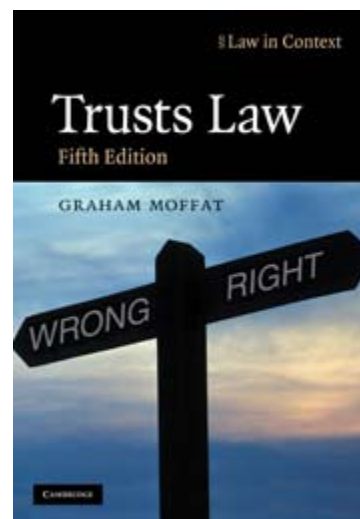
