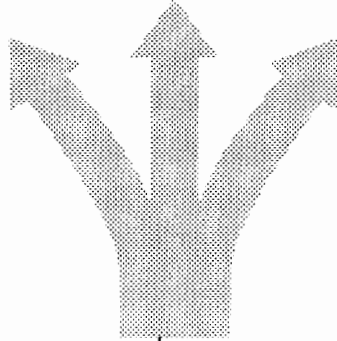

**AD HOC COMMITTEE ON WESTLAW/LEXIS POLICIES SEEKS INPUT**

Nancy Johnson, the Chair of the AALL Academic Libraries SIS, has asked me to chair an Ad Hoc Committee on WESTLAW/LEXIS policies. The Committee is an outgrowth of a discussion held at the SIS Business Meeting in San Francisco.

As you've read in *From the Chair*, there is a growing feeling among academic librarians that a variety of problems have arisen due to WESTLAW/LEXIS marketing and use within law schools. It is the Committee's hope to learn the librarians' specific concerns and then work with the vendors to achieve mutually beneficial solutions.

As a first step, the Committee is identifying experiences and problems from as many librarians as possible. The members are to report librarians' concerns and frustrations with the CALR services, including any impact on library operations that are not directly related to CALR. Once we know the particulars, we will determine how to approach the vendors.

The committee members have been asked to contact their colleagues to solicit information. If you have not been contacted, please feel free to send your responses to me. We plan to have all the responses transcribed and distributed to committee members. The answers we receive will then determine our future action.

Martha Brown, the AALL Director of Programs, reports that scheduling information for the 1993 Annual Meeting was sent to Committee and SIS Chairs, Caucus Chairs, Chapter Presidents, and Affiliate Group contact persons in early October. Other groups interested in scheduling an event at the 1993 Meeting should call Martha as soon as possible to obtain the planning information. Every attempt will be made to accommodate all groups, however, AALL constituent groups receive priority for time and space.

For those working on 1993 budgets, the registration fee for the meeting will be set by the Executive Board at its November 21st meeting; hotel room rate in the Association's room block range from a low of \$86.00 single/\$130.00 double to a high of \$122.00 single/\$147.00 double, plus a 9% Boston City and Room tax per night. AALL members may expect to receive the Preliminary Mailing for the Meeting in early March.

ACADEMIC LAW LIBRARIES SIS ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING  
JULY 19, 1992  
MINUTES

The 1992 Business Meeting of the Academic Law Libraries SIS was called to order on Sunday, July 19, 1992, by Chair Bruce Johnson.

The minutes of the 1991 meeting, as appeared in the ALL SIS Newsletter, were approved. The Treasury balance as of May 31, 1992, stood at \$5,206.00, an amount which does not yet reflect the annual meeting expenses. The election results for Vice Chair/Chair-Elect, the only position open this year, are as follows: approximately 500 ballots were sent, with 298 responses. Arturo Torres was elected as Vice Chair/Chair-Elect.

Arturo Torres addressed the meeting requesting new program proposals for the 1993 meeting in Boston. He advised that the deadlines for proposals at AALL headquarters is August 14, 1992, and therefore, deadlines for consideration by the ALL Board will be August 5, 1992.

Stella Chiang, the Senior Program Officer for the Research Libraries Group (RLG) again provided an update of the latest RLG developments. She indicated that RLG will continue to support its technical processing and interlibrary loan services, but the focus has shifted to other issues as well. These include 1) an expanded base of membership, creating a broader alliance of libraries, and 2) information access and delivery services.

Merle Slyhoff, incoming Chair of the SIS Council, then spoke about the impact of the Council's meeting on ALL. Among the topics discussed were the unifying of various SIS discussion groups and urging each special interest section to market itself through the development of strategic plans and through public relations efforts in newsletters on the chapter level, the SIS level and the national level. This will also be accomplished through a unified manual describing the special interest sections.

The third topic addressed was recruitment to law librarianship. There was no response at the Business Meeting, but Bruce suggested that anyone interested should attend the open forum on recruitment to the profession.

Bruce then thanked his executive board for their work, including Ann Puckett for continuing to provide assistance to him throughout the year; Nancy Johnson, Vice Chair/Chair-Elect, Sara Robbins, Secretary/Treasurer, and Faye Jones, who did a wonderful job editing the newsletter this year and who has agreed to continue for the coming year.

He then announced the ALL reception which would be held Tuesday afternoon from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Bancroft-Whitney Building. He then thanked Bancroft-Whitney for providing the space and a subsidy towards the expenses of the reception and the following law schools for their contributions: Stanford, Golden Gate, Hastings, McGeorge and Santa Clara. A special thanks was then given to Gail Winson for her extraordinary efforts in arranging this reception.

Last year's bylaws amendment regarding election deadlines was approved and was met in this year's elections.

Membership of the ALL SIS stands in the mid-500's. Bruce indicated that the effect on membership of the dues increase and the newspaper package plan is not yet known. He is looking forward to continued growth, but he indicated that the SIS is not yet close to the percentage of involvement by individuals working in the academic environment and their membership in the SIS, as is evident in the PLL. Bruce found the Section and Committee Marketplace at CONELL to be a very effective and productive opportunity to discuss ALL, its role, purpose, etc. The question, though, is how to better involve new members.

This year, both a Directors' Workshop and a Mid-Managers Workshop were held on Sunday morning and both appeared to be great successes. Since the Mid-Managers Workshop is now well established, the question arises as to whether something should be developed for those members of the SIS in front-line, nonmanagerial positions. Much more needs to be done for this group of individuals to make them feel a part of the section.

Among the issues concerning the ALL are the question of whether or not the SIS should be more pro-active; in the past it has always been reactive to issues, such as Lexis and Westlaw pricing. Should this approach change? A second issue was whether or not the names of the special interest sections should be changed from SIS to Sections. This issue will be publicly debated in some forum this year.

Bruce then presented an announcement from Bill Lindberg of Westlaw: West has established the "West Excellence in Academic Law Librarianship Award". This award recognizes law librarians who distinguish themselves in managing and providing effective access to information and includes a prize of \$10,000.00. Wes Cochran (Texas Tech University Law Library) raised the question of the timing of this award, especially in light of the concerns regarding the current bill, H.R.4426, now pending in Congress involving the removal of copyright protection from legal citations. West has been actively soliciting AALL Copyright Committee members to argue against this bill and Wes suggested maybe there is an issue here to be looked into.

Bruce then asked if there was any old business -- none was raised; any new business -- none was raised. He then announced the roundtables which would follow the close of the Business Meeting: Library Administration, to be led by Wes Cochran; Interlibrary Loan to be led by Jan Goldsmith; Fees-for-Service, to be led by Merle Slyhoff; and Collection Development to be led by Phil Burwick.

Nancy Johnson, the incoming Chair, then spoke, thanking Bruce Johnson for all of his efforts and Sara and Faye for continuing in their current roles this coming year. Faye, is looking for articles and materials for upcoming newsletter issues. She will continue to edit these issues, but she needs participation from members of the SIS. The leaders of the roundtables to follow the Business Meeting were requested to do summaries of their sessions for the first issue of the newsletter.

Nancy then announced the various programs sponsored by the SIS at this year's annual meeting. These include "Real Training is Not Informal: Developing Staff Training Plans"; "Hard Times: Enduring Economic Adversity in Academic and Public Law Libraries"; "Mandatory Continuing Legal Education"; "Training with Multimedia, Computers and Other Gadgets"; and "Feminist Jurisprudence". She also requested that individuals who submitted programs last year which were not accepted to please speak to Arturo about presenting them again this year.

Nancy then focused in on her goals for the coming year. She expects to begin a few new projects and she invites participation by all members, including new members.

Nancy has set up an ad hoc committee to define the problems with LEXIS and WESTLAW policies and to seek a means to address them in a unified voice. Camille Riley and Faye Jones have been asked to be on this committee; anyone else interested should please notify Nancy. Nancy also indicated that a brochure describing the SIS needs to be developed. A nominating committee will need to be appointed for the two positions which will be open for the ALL SIS Board next year: Secretary/Treasurer and Vice Chair/Chair-Elect.

Nancy then announced that Harvard has graciously agreed to hold the ALL reception in Boston in 1993. Terry Martin asked for feedback on what people would be interested in seeing while at Harvard.

The business portion of the meeting then concluded and attendees broke up into the designated roundtables.

## **ALL-SIS PROGRAM PROPOSALS FOR BOSTON MIDDLE MANAGEMENT MEETING REPORT**

The Section submitted a total of five programs to the AALL Education Committee. The three that remain under consideration are: (1) Management Skills for New and Prospective Managers; (2) Access, Needs and the Internet ... A Town Meeting; and (3) Finding Your Way Off the Plateau.

Lei Seeger, Education Committee Chair, reports that 162 program proposals were submitted but only 48 to 60 programs can be accommodated at the Boston meeting facilities. The Committee was pleased by the overall quality of the programs submitted. Lei encourages continued active involvement in the program planning for future meetings. She noted that several of the proposals selected by the Committee this year are resubmissions from an earlier year.

The Section also proposes to co-sponsor several Programs and Workshops, including, but not limited to:

(1) Changing Images: Optical Imaging in Law Libraries (with OBS/SIS)

(2) Training for Clerks (with RS/SIS)

(3) The Anthony Burns Case and Antebellum Boston Legal History (with Legal History & Rare Books SIS)

(4) Workshop: Protecting and Care of Rare Books and Manuscripts Collections (with Legal History and Rare Books SIS, TS/SIS, and Preservation Committee)

(5) Workshop: Moving Forward: Reconceptualizing Resources and Services in Recessionary Times (with RS/SIS, ASD/SIS, OBS/SIS, and SCCLL/SIS)

(6) EC Update: Current Issues and Online Research (with FCIL/SIS and PLL/SIS)

(7) Foreign and International Law Collection Development on a Shoestring (with FCIL/SIS, PLL/SIS, and TS/SIS' Acquisitions Committee)

(8) Treaty Indexes: Unlocking Their Secrets for the Novice User (with FCIL/SIS, PLL/SIS, and GovDocs/SIS)

(9) Working Trip Abroad for Law Librarians (with FCIL/SIS)

(10) Antarctica: World Patrimony or Ecological-Economic War Zone? (with FCIL/SIS and GovDocs SIS)

(11) Comparative Law II: The Next Generation of Comparative Legal Analysis: Reflections Upon Method (with FCIL/SIS)

(12) Workshop: Teaching Transnational, Foreign, and Comparative Legal Research to the Next Generation (with FCIL/SIS and Research Instruction Caucus).

**Arturo Torres, Vice-Chair**

Interest in a middle managers meeting first surfaced at the AALL Conference in Minneapolis in 1989. This interest was continued in New Orleans in 1990. Those of us who met in the Middle Managers Roundtable at the ALL SIS Business Meeting agreed that we would like a separate meeting of some sort --- not necessarily like the Director's meeting -- but one of our own nevertheless. We wanted a place in which to talk to our peers about professional issues and to network in a loosely structured setting.

One of our early difficulties was in defining who middle managers are. Every library has only one director; so it's easy to figure out who can go to the directors' meeting. But middle management is another matter. We decided to make the group self-selecting. It is open to anyone who is interested in issues pertaining to middle management. Nearly anyone in a professional position could be interested.

The first meeting was organized by Charles Ten Brink of the University of Chicago and Marsha Baum then of the University of Connecticut. At the first meeting, there were about ten tables of ten people each. After two short commentaries, each table began a discussion. A leader at each table kept the conversation going and made sure everyone had the opportunity to speak. This was the heart of the meeting. There was no restriction on topics. They included problem workers and directors, career advancement and plateauing, implementing new technologies and managing change, and knowing which hat we are wearing at any given time during the day. It lasted an hour and a half with only one break. At the end, Charles and Marsha summarized some of the points that came out of the discussions.

The first meeting was a great success with very positive evaluations. Attendees liked the format of the meeting and expressed a strong desire for another one the next year. A typical comment was, "Excellent! Looking forward to next year. I liked the informality with everyone getting to participate ..."

This year's meeting was organized by Ajaye Bloomstone of Louisiana State University and me. Jacqueline Orlando of Capital University gave an eye-opening talk highlighting the different points of view of directors and middle managers on personnel management. Once again, the heart of the meeting was the discussion that followed. About 90 people attended.

The Middle Management meeting offers a unique opportunity. You can get out of the meeting just about anything you want. You are free to ask questions, share your experiences, change the topic, or just listen. If you're looking for a place to meet your peers, a place to discuss some specific "real world" problems, a meeting that is informal and friendly, a meeting that you can participate in and learn from; this is it. I look forward to meeting you there next year!

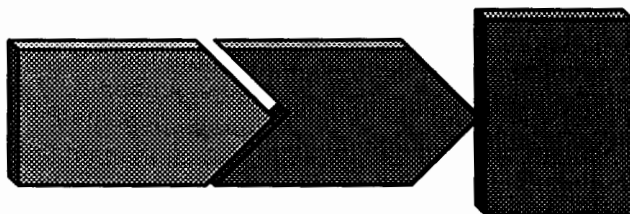
## ***ANNUAL REPORT AALL LIAISON TO THE ALA INTERLIBRARY LOAN COMMITTEE***

Budget cuts and increased resource sharing through electronic means were the main themes of interlibrary loan discussion as I completed my third year as AALL liaison to the ALA Interlibrary Loan Committee. I attended both the Midwinter Meeting in San Antonio and the Annual Meeting in San Francisco this year, and both the ILL Discussion Group and Committee Meeting sessions. The discussion group program this summer, as in the past, covered reports from vendors (OCLC, RLG, CARL, and BLDSC) and the Canadian Library Association (CLA). CLA has actually changed its Interlibrary Loan Committee's name to the Committee on Resource Sharing, which gives an indication of the concerns facing librarians everywhere. The large vendors reported on new products, either recent or on the near horizon; the CARL representative talked about UNCOVER2, a document delivery service, and the RLG representative spoke about ARIEL, which has now sold 320 packages, and CITADEL, a new service to be offered this year. CITADEL might be of particular interest to law librarians because it will include references to the Index to Foreign Legal Periodicals and the World Law Index-Hispanic Legislation.

The ILL Committee meeting, chaired this year by Mary Williamson of the Wisconsin Interlibrary Services in Madison, dealt primarily with the first draft of the Model Interlibrary Loan Code, and a draft presented to the group by the ACRL Rare Books and Manuscripts Section on the loan of rare materials. There was some talk of trying to incorporate the "Guidelines for the Loan of Rare and Unique Materials" into the Interlibrary Loan Code. After discussion, it was agreed that we could have separate guidelines as an appendix to the code itself since we are trying to keep the code as simple as possible. When the first draft of the model ILL code was discussed, most people in the group felt that the code should be aligned more closely with the previous code, though the Code Revision Committee felt it should be a fresh document; the discussion was temporarily tabled until more work could be completed on the code. The meeting ended with a description of the ILL program proposal for the 1993 ALA Annual Meeting in New Orleans.

As in the past, I have found it very productive to be an active part of the ILL Committee by being present at the meetings. ALA issues will be discussed at both the Readers' Services SIS and the Academic SIS's annual business meetings. The new AALL liaison to the ALA Committee, since my three year term has ended, will be Monica Ortale of the South Texas College of Law Library.
