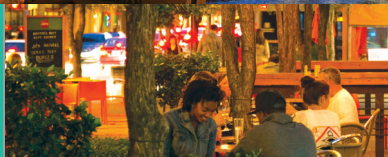

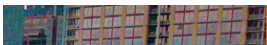

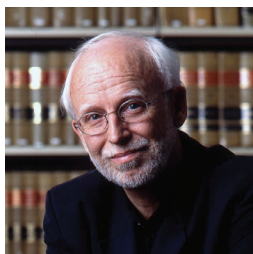

The Distinguished Service Award, established in 1984, recognizes extended and sustained service to law librarianship, exemplary service to the Association, and/or contributions to the professional literature. The award was renamed for Marian Gould Gallagher in 1990. Gallagher Award recipients are additionally recognized with induction into the AALL Hall of Fame.



### Richard A. Danner

Archibald C. and Frances Fulk Ruffy

Richard A. Danner began his career as a law librarian at the University of Wisconsin Law School serving as a student assistant, before becoming the head of periodicals and eventually the environmental law librarian. After receiving his JD from Wisconsin in 1979, he started at Duke University School of Law as associate director of the law library and professor; in 1981, he was promoted to senior associate dean. In 2003, he was appointed as the Archibald C. and Frances Fulk Ruffy research professor of law.

Danner served as AALL's president from 1989–1990 and as president of the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries from 1985–1986. His remarkable service to the Association goes well beyond his role as president; he served as editor of *Law Library Journal* for 10 years. Danner has received numerous awards and honors from AALL for this work, including the Hall of Fame award in 2014. He is an advocate for open access to legal information and was one of the first people to argue for the advancement of open access publication of academic law reviews. Notably, all of Duke University's journals have been online and free for all users since the late 1990s. Identifying a need, Danner was one of the first directors to create a librarian position for statistical analysis for empirical legal studies.

### **Karl T. Gruben**

Karl T. Gruben's stellar career spanned across library types. He began his career at the Texas State Law Library as a government law librarian, before moving into the private sector at Vinson & Elkins LLP and Squire Sanders & Dempsey. He then proceeded into academia, where he served as law library director and associate professor of law at St. Thomas University Law School in Minneapolis, before moving to the University of San Diego to serve as associate dean for library and information services, professor of law, and director of the legal research center.

An AALL member since 1975, he served on numerous committees, including the Committee Structure Special Committee, which oversaw a complete review of all AALL committees. He also served on the Executive Board as both a member and secretary. In addition to his extensive service to AALL, he contributed his leadership skills to other local and regional associations, including Houston Area Law Librarians, where he served as president. Gruben passed away in November 2016. He was aware that his colleagues had begun the process of preparing the nomination materials for this prestigious award and was honored by the prospect of being considered. Gruben's extensive leadership activities and contributions to law librarianship make him a worthy recipient of the Marian Gould Gallagher Award.

### Gitelle Seer

Gitelle Seer completed her MS at Columbia University School of Library Service in 1968, after which she embarked on a remarkable career at Dewey Ballantine LLP, serving as director of the library (the firm eventually became known as Dewey & LeBoeuf). In the mid-1970s, after taking time off following the birth of her first child, she worked part-time as an assistant librarian at Coudert Brothers in New York for several years, before returning part-time, and then full-time, to Dewey until her retirement in 2011.

Seer's significant contributions to law librarianship culminated in leadership positions at both the national and regional levels. She served as secretary and as a member on AALL's Executive Board and participated in several AALL committees, including the AALL Chapter Summit Planning Committee. At the chapter level, she served as president, vice-president, and as a member of the Board of Directors for the Law Librarian Association of Greater New York. Many of her contemporaries praise her willingness to be a positive role model and mentor to law librarians—always encouraging others to engage and learn. Her work in law firm libraries has been featured in various publications, including *American Lawyer*, *National Law Journal*, and *New York Law Journal*. She also contributed to the book *Law Librarianship in the Digital Age* by Ellyssa Kroski, which was awarded the Joseph L. Andrews Legal Literature Award in 2014.

*The Legal Patrimony of Haiti: An Annotated Bibliography*

The *Legal Patrimony of Haiti*, published by William S. Hein & Co., Inc., tracks the legal history of Haiti from its colonial past through independence to the twenty-first century. As stated in a nomination letter, "With the heightened interest in Haiti following the earthquake of 2010, and the troubled state of its institutions in the decades before that, the goal of *The Legal Patrimony of Haiti* is to provide a comprehensive and bilingual bibliographic foundation upon which Haitians and others of goodwill can re-start the process of building Haitian legal and governmental institutions." Since its publication, identified material has been digitized and made free to Haitian citizens.

Amelung is professor emeritus of legal research at the Vincent C. Immel Law Library at Saint Louis University, where he served as associate director until his retirement in 2013. Prior to his appointment as associate director in 2006, he served as the law library's head of technical services. In recognition of his work, AALL's Technical Services Special Interest Section awarded him the Renee D. Chapman Memorial Award for Outstanding Contributions in Technical Services Law Librarianship in 1997. Amelung currently serves as chairman of the board of the LLMC.

Kathleen Richman, executive director of the LLMC, along with her staff, compiled the bibliography for this book.

*Elbridge Thomas Gerry: An Exceptional Life  
in Gilded Gotham*

*Elbridge Thomas Gerry: An Exceptional Life in Gilded Gotham* provides an extensive historical biography on the founder of the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Elbridge Thomas Gerry (1837–1927), was also legal counsel to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and the father of six children, one of whom became a United States Senator. To date, very little has been written about Gerry, the grandson of a founding father, Vice President Elbridge Gerry. He spent his days as a prominent New York City lawyer and philanthropist. Following his death in 1927, his 30,000-volume personal law library was donated to the U.S. Supreme Court as its founding collection.

Dowling served as director of the U.S. Supreme Court Library for 15 years until her retirement in mid-2003. Since retiring from William & Mary School of Law in 2010 where she taught legal research, she has worked full-time researching and writing the book on Gerry in addition to editing the annual book, *The State of the Federal Judiciary*, published by William S. Hein. To aid in her research on the Gerry biography, she received the 2012–2013 Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History Fellowship from the New York Historical Society.

**Jessica Winston**

Chair, History Department and  
Professor of English

*Lawyers at Play: Literature, Law, and Politics at  
the Early Modern Inns of Court, 1558-1581*



In sixteenth-century England, barristers were trained at the Inns of Court. In addition to barristers, many early poets and playwrights were also members of the Inns. *Lawyers at Play* focuses on the influence of the literary and legal cultures of the Inns during the first decade of the reign of Elizabeth I, looking at the players who shaped the English Renaissance, especially in the areas of lyric poetry, dramatic tragedy, satire, and masque. Winston's book delves into one of the most formative and understudied periods of the English Renaissance.

Winston is a professor of English and chair of History at Idaho State University in Pocatello, Idaho. Her research focuses on Renaissance literature and culture (c. 1475–1640), especially the literary culture of the early English law schools and legal societies, including the Inns of Court. Her research has been supported by a Mellon Foundation Sawyer Seminar Postdoctoral Fellowship (University of Aberdeen) and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Additionally, as an advocate for public humanities, she gives talks about the history of the Inns of Court and their relationship to the American Inns of Court to local chapters of the American Inns.

Joyce Manna Janto is currently the deputy director at the University of Richmond School of Law Library. She previously worked as the acquisitions librarian and associate director for collection development at the University of Richmond.

With more than 30 years of experience in the profession, including a membership with AALL since 1981, Janto has made significant contributions to law librarianship. In addition to numerous speaking engagements at AALL Annual Meetings and the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries (SEAALL) Annual Meeting, she gave the keynote address at the 2011 meeting of the Chilean Law Librarians Association.

Janto is an exemplary leader in the profession, with past service on the AALL Executive Board as president and treasurer. On a regional level, Janto has served as president of SEAALL and as president of the Virginia Association of Law Libraries. She remains active with continued committee service that has included serving as chair of the Nominations Committee, Placement Committee, and Mentoring Committee. She currently serves as a member of the Bylaws and Resolutions Committee. Janto's continued commitment to law librarianship and AALL has never waned. She continues to be a leader, innovator, and a source of knowledge for other librarians. She can now add the well-deserved AALL Hall of Fame Award to her list of professional accomplishments.

Catherine “Cathy” Lemann has been a member of AALL for 28 years. In this time, she has made many significant contributions to the Association as well as the profession. In 2013, she retired from her position as the circuit librarian for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit in Richmond, Virginia. Since her retirement, she has continued working part-time in law librarianship as a research librarian for the Law Library of Louisiana.

At the national level, Lemann served on the AALL Executive Board as president and secretary. She served as chair of several AALL committees, including the Nominations and Appointments Committees, and the Membership Development and Retention Task Force. She also served as chair of the Council of Special Interest Section (SIS) Chairs, representing all chairs of special interest sections, and as chair of the Government Law Libraries SIS. At the regional level, she served as president of both the New Orleans Association of Law Librarians and the Southeastern Chapter of the American Association of Law Libraries. She remains active in service as a member of the Awards Committee and the Emerging Leader Award Jury. In 2001, she received both the Spirit of Librarianship Award and the O. James Werner Award for Distinctive Service to People with Disabilities. Even in retirement, Lemann continues to make great contributions to AALL and is a worthy recipient of the AALL Hall of Fame Award.

Melody Lembke currently serves as the associate law librarian for collection services at the University of California Irvine School of Law Library. A member since 1976, her service to the Association includes several leadership positions—most notably serving on the AALL Executive Board and chairing the Nominations Committee as well as the Technical Services Special Interest Section. In addition to her AALL leadership roles, she served as a member of several AALL committees, including the Long Range Planning Committee (1989-1990), the Annual Meeting Program Committee, the Committee on Committees, and the Executive Director Search Committee. On a regional level, she served as an executive board member for the Southern California Association of Law Libraries (SCALL).

An advocate for law librarians in the technical services field, Lembke was the co-director of the 1992 AALL Cataloging Institute. She also coordinated, moderated, and spoke on many panels of interest at AALL, the Practising Law Institute, and SCALL. Her efforts in the field were rewarded with the 1996 Renee D. Chapman Memorial Award for Outstanding Contributions in Technical Services Law Librarianship. She has been a great mentor to many and a pioneer in law librarianship and technical services throughout her career. Maryruth Storer is currently law library director at the Orange County Public Law Library in Santa Ana, California. She began her career in law librarianship in 1978 at the University of Tennessee. Since joining AALL in 1996, Storer has been extremely active in committee work, with a long record of service to AALL and the profession. She dedicated her time and expertise to the Association when she was elected to serve as an AALL Executive Board member. In addition, she served as chair of the Awards Committee, Biennial Salary Survey Task Force, Bylaws and Resolutions Committee, Membership Committee, and the Government Law Libraries Special Interest Section.

Storer served as chair of the Council of SIS Chairs, representing all chairs of special interest sections, and as chair of the Council of Chapter Presidents, representing all chapters of the Association, being one of only a handful of individuals to hold both roles. She currently serves as a member of the Chapter Professional Development Award Jury.
